We were very pleased to have a good audience at St Johns Church.

The Choir opened the concert with A Great and Mighty Wonder, an Old German tune harmonised by M. Praetorius, followed by the popular Ding Dong! Merrily on High, based on a C.16 secular French dance tune. Then the audience joined in O little town of Bethlehem, a traditional English tune arranged by Vaughan Williams.

The first reading was an excerpt from **How Green was my Valley** by Richard Llewellyn. Then the choir sang **Deck the Hall**, a traditional Welsh carol, and **Nativity Carol**, one of John Rutter's earliest pieces.

After a reading of **Why the Bells Chimed** by Raymond Alden, the audience joined in the popular **Hark** the Herald Angels Sing.

In keeping with the concert theme, the choir sang **Carol of the Bells**, a popular Christmas carol based on the Ukrainian New Year's song "Shchedryk." This was followed by **The Coventry Carol,** a more serious C.16 English Christmas carol.

A reading of Ring out, Wild Bells by Alfred Tennyson, was followed by the choir singing, Adam lay ybounden, a C.15 macaronic English text of unknown origin. Then the audience joined in, It Came Upon The Midnight Clear, a traditional English tune adapted by Sir Arthur Sullivan.

As in previous years, Richard Hills delighted us all with an improvised organ solo on Christmas melodies.

O Come, All Ye Faithful, an anonymous C.18 carol, was the last piece which everyone sang.

Matthew Woodward & Michael Veazey treated us to a delightful **Sleigh Ride for Piano Duet** by Leroy Anderson.

The choir ended the concert with the light hearted **Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas** and the traditional West Country Carol, **We Wish You a Merry Christmas**.
